### **BACKGROUND:**

The Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) is conducting a study referred to as the US 85 Planning and Environmental Linkages (PEL). The objective of the US 85 PEL Study is to develop a strategic vision for U.S. 85 between I-76 and the Town of Nunn. The vision for the corridor is to identify the safety and operational needs along U.S. 85 and determine its short-term and long-term transportation priorities. The study will consider the U.S. 85 Access Control Plan and determine if aspects of that plan need to be refreshed. Short-term and long-term improvements will be prioritized through a collaborative process with stakeholders and the public along the corridor.

The final product will include a series of projects with a prioritization/implementation plan that will help to obtain funding for improvements along corridor.

- 4. Emergency Access Discussion of 144<sup>th</sup> verses 136<sup>th</sup> for primary access to the hospital in Brighton.
- 5. Upcoming Public Meetings.
- 6. Next Steps.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Option C: Combination of in-house staff and contracted work

### **BACKGROUND:**

The Adams County Board of County Commissioners approved 1.5 million dollars to establish a program to maintain more of the County drainage infrastructure. The Adams County Stromwater and Infrastructure division of the Transportation Department have evaluated several options to achieve this overall goal. Please see the three options listed below:

Option A: In-house staff dedicated to perform drainage maintenance. This option will require 7 additional full time employees (FTE) and the need to purchase equipment.

Option B: An outside contractor hired to perform drainage maintenance. This option will require 1 additional full time employee (FTE) to develop projects and have oversight over the work.

Option C: A Combination of in-house staff dedicated to addressing minor maintenance issues in addition to hiring a contractor to address larger drainage maintenance issues as necessary. This option will require 3 to 5 additional full time employees (FTE) which would be phased in over time.

### Owning vs Leasing

Purpose - estimate cost differential of owning vs. leasing vac truck.

Timeframe - 10 years

**Summary Outcome** - Given current key input, by year 10, leasing is more expensive than owning by a factor of 1.47:1 (includes orig capital outlay).

Leasing is a better financial choice if the service rendered by operating the vac truck will have a life of 5 yrs or less.



STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

### **BACKGROUND:**

Access to capital is a recurring issue for small businesses. Colorado Enterprise Fund (CEF) was founded in 1976 as a nonprofit lending source for small businesses that are unable to obtain traditional bank financing. Adams County has expressed interest in funding a microloan program, but is prohibited by state statute from operating the program. CEF will match dollarfor-dollar any Adams County contributions to the fund. Adams County Economic Development, Inc., (ACED) is prepared to sponsor the program, with CEF as the administrator and grantee. ACED would organize a panel of bank and financial professionals to review and make recommendations to CEF. CEF makes the final decision on all applicants. Microloan amounts would range from as little as \$2,000 to a maximum of \$50,000. CEF would regularly report program data and statistics to ACED, who will report to Adams County.

# Adams County Microloan Fund Program

A partnership between

### CEF's Record of Success & Accountability

- 40 years of lending to Colorado businesses
- Since 1976, CEF has used federal and foundation funds to provide loans to Front Range small businesses that have difficulty obtaining financing from traditional sources but are capable of repaying debt
- Community-sponsored loan programs, also known as "microloans," in partnership with Boulder (1995 & 2009), Arvada (2011), Longmont (2012), Weld County (2013), and Rocky Mountain Innosphere (2013)
- Loan amounts up to \$50,000 for a maximum of five (5) years



#### How the Partnership Works

- Adams County and ACED enter into an agreement to create and fund a community-sponsored loan fund program
- Adams County provides funds to ACED
- ACED enters into an Agreement with CEF to create and manage a segregated, community-sponsored loan fund program to be called the Adams County Microloan Fund Program
- CEF matches 1-to-1 the Adams County funds deposited by ACED
- CEF actively managed the Adams County Microloan Fund Program
- ACED markets the loan fund program to Adams County businesses



#### How the Loan Application and Approval Works

- Businesses can apply directly to CEF or may be referred by ACED members, banks, SBDCs, etc.
- At the request of CEF, loan applications may be reviewed by a committee of bank and financial professionals organized by ACED
- Loan applications generally will be approved or denied following CEF's standard procedures and processes
- CEF generally follows its usual underwriting and loan application process



#### **Business Eligibility**

- A business must have its primary office/headquarters or operations within Adams County at the time of application and throughout the terms of the loan
- Any type of business is eligible so long as the business activity is legal under federal law and state law, and in the best interest of the community
- Home-based businesses are not eligible, unless the loan directly helps the business transition into retail, commercial or industrial space
- A business must file all completed application information and meet program underwriting criteria established by CEF


